Become a Coral Reef Ambassador

Florida's Coral Reef stretches nearly 350 miles from the Dry Tortugas to the St. Lucie Inlet, and it is home to over 500 species of fish, along with many species of turtles and sharks as well. August is a special time of the year, because, around the time of the full moon, corals ensure the survivability of their species by spawning.

While ecologically important, Florida's Coral Reef is also critical to the economy! Reef-related activities contribute \$6.1 billion dollars and support 71,000 jobs annually, and healthy coral reefs also safeguard against extreme weather, shoreline erosion, and coastal flooding.



Although there are multiple stressors affecting our reef resources, the 5 counties along Florida's Coral Reef developed the <u>Coral Reef Ambassadors</u> program to help residents, tourists, boaters, fishermen and divers understand how they can help conserve and protect our local reefs.
